Additional Education: Law School

A person involved Sports Law manages legal issues at a college/university or professional level such as the Olympics. Sports law could also take the form of Health Policy development. Persons in the field would work in areas of ethical conduct and various sections of financial aid, recruiting, gender equity and academic standards (University Level).

Note: The following courses are recommended courses, and are not mandatory for completion of a BKIN. Prospective Law students are generally expected to have an LSAT score of 166 and a CGPA of 83%. Students do not have prerequisites but are suggested to study in the area for which they want to practice law (ex. Kinesiology courses for if they want to practice sports law).

Career Planning Tips

ASSESS: Self discovery
Reflect and write down your interests, values, personality traits, and skills.

EXPLORE: Self awareness and career options
